From The Pastor's Desk

Greetings... First Baptist Church Westwood & Friends

"The kingdom of God is like this," he said. "A man scatters seed on the ground.

He sleeps and rises night and day;

the seed sprouts and grows, although he doesn't know how."

Mark 4:26-27

Praise God for seeing another Summer! I wish you a peaceful Independence Day/July 4th holiday. I'll speak for myself but would guess that you too are thankful to be a <u>citizen</u> of the United States of America. Regardless of the current state of the country, few people in this moment in history take the *weightiness* of their American citizenship for granted.

But dear Christian, do you understand the *weightiness* of citizenship in the Kingdom of God? It was central to Jesus Christ's public teachings shared with multitudes of people and explained in private to His true followers. By His Spirit the early Church believed in the power of God's Kingdom on earth. We must also! God's Kingdom continues to exude supernatural power and action inspiring us to be true to The Great Commission. Our dual citizenship also tethers us to godly guidance in everyday life.

The Church is saying, "Yes!" to being led by God's Spirit When taken seriously, the Lord's Prayer models an oath of supreme reverence and submission of human will to the Father's will. It reminds us to relax in total reliance upon God, come what may. We practice refreshing our faith with childlike trust...

'O! Amazing Grace how sweet the sound that saved a wretch like me! I once was lost but now I'm found! Was blind, but now I see!'

In Mark's Gospel verses we find a fascinating promise! We are of God's Kingdom on earth. The Church is promised vitality and thriving life. In God's economy seeds <u>will</u> sprout miraculously... plants <u>will</u> grow miraculously ...

crops <u>will</u> yield abundance of 30, some 60, some 100 fold miraculously! But the fulfillment of vitality and thriving <u>even in 'dry' seasons</u> only happens when we plant the way Jesus said to! Use Gospel seed. As you go this Summer, sow!! your little Gospel seeds. There's good soil (souls) awaiting. One of your simple personal experiences about Jesus will do it, then leave the rest to God. People's hearts are already prepared for your path. Believe! (John 6:29) and take a posture of patient expectancy. We are all poster children for God's transforming love and forgiveness found in Jesus Christ.

"And he said, "With what can we compare the kingdom of God, or what parable can we use to describe it? It's like a mustard seed that, when sown upon the soil, is the smallest of all the seeds on the ground. And when sown, it comes up and grows taller than all the garden plants, and produces large branches, so that the birds of the sky can nest in its shade."

It's not too late for Summer planting in New England!

"July is a good time to plant beans, cucumbers, and summer squash. It's also a good time to start seeds for fall harvest vegetables like broccoli, cabbage, and kale!"







A HISTORIC BAPTIST DISCOVERY: Lost Anti-slavery document found after 120 years

We are excited to share some truly extraordinary news from the Baptist Archives at the TABCOM offices in Groton. A long-missing and historically significant document has been found—one that sheds light on the bold witness of Massachusetts Baptists in the fight against slavery.

While cataloguing and organizing archival materials, a small team of dedicated Baptist volunteers had been on the lookout for a document known only from a mention in the 1902 centennial history of the


Massachusetts Baptist Missionary Society and the Massachusetts Baptist Convention. The document, titled "A Resolution and Protest Against Slavery," was originally written in 1847 under the direction of the Boston Baptist Association and was signed by 116 Baptist ministers—most from Massachusetts and a few from other parts of New England.

Until now, this resolution had only been seen in a published reproduction from that centennial volume. Its physical whereabouts remained a mystery. Efforts to locate the original document at the Massachusetts State Library, Brown University, Harvard University, and the American Baptist Historical Society proved unsuccessful. It was, for many Baptist historians, the "Holy Grail" of abolitionist-era Baptist documents.

Then, on Saturday, May 24, 2025, something remarkable happened. While installing new shelving in the archives, **Rev. John Odams** (First Baptist Church Boston) and **Jen Cromack** (First Baptist Church Westwood) moved a banker's box and discovered a long, narrow archival container. Inside was a carefully rolled scroll—approximately 4 to 5 feet in length and 9 inches wide. Upon opening it, they immediately recognized what it was: the original Resolution and Protest Against Slavery, complete with all 116 handwritten signatures.

Every name on the scroll has since been verified, along with the churches where these courageous ministers served. The document is not only an inspiring testament to our Baptist forebears' moral conviction—it is a powerful witness to the Gospel's call for justice.

A special Juneteenth and Historical Celebration was held on Saturday, June 21st at the TABCOM offices in Groton where people gathered to honor the recovery of this vital piece of Baptist history and view the original document firsthand, along with touring the archives and enjoying fellowship and refreshments.

Pull-Tabs for Shriners Hospital

Are you aware that for years we've been collecting pull-tabs from beverage cans — and we're still doing it? Why? Here's the story.

Shriners Hospitals in Springfield and Boston have been collecting pull-tabs or "pop-tops" from beverage cans since 1989, recycling them, and putting the money toward programs that directly benefit children. The pull-tabs are the only pure aluminum part of the beverage can, and there are approximately 1,200 to 1,400 tabs in one pound. Since the program's inception, about a half-million pounds of aluminum tabs have been collected and recycled.

We donate the tabs to the Shriners' Burns Hospital – Boston. Neil Patterson coordinates this project, and Ken Shaw delivers the tabs to the hospital. There is a plastic jug in the Reception Room at church where you can leave the tabs you have removed from beverage cans.

Their website reminds us that Shriners' Children's Hospitals are "always here for our patients, regardless of a family's ability to pay or insurance status".

You can help a Shriner help a child. Donate pull-tabs for recycling.
